Principles for Accessible Captions

These captioning guidelines combine resources from the <u>Described and Captioned Media Program</u> (DCMP), WCAG 2.1 recommendations and guidance from <u>3Play Media</u> to offer useful principles to follow when creating or editing captions:

- 1. Captions are synchronized to match spoken content.
- 2. Captions are at least 99% accurate. This means that there is a 1% chance of error. In a video segment with 1500 words, this means 15 or fewer errors in a total. The accuracy rate of most machine captions is around 80-95%.
- 3. Captions are one or two lines. Generally it is best to keep each line at 32 characters or less.
- 4. **New sentences start on a new line.** If sentences must be broken up, break them at a logical phrase.
- 5. Captions are on screen for 3 to 6 seconds long enough for the reader to read them. They should not remain on screen when there is silence.
- 6. **Captions indicate when no audio is playing.** If an entire video clip has no sound, a note should indicate that "no sound is used in this video."
- 7. Captions include non-speech sounds such as cheering, horns honking. These sounds are conventionally provided in brackets, e.g., [horn honking].
- 8. Captions must include all of the dialogue, verbatim or in essence. Sometimes speech is simplified (for example, removing repeated words or phrases, ums, or confusing changes). When this is done to help the reader, it does not invalidate a caption's compliance to the standard.
- 9. Captions are uniform in style and presentation, do not use all capital letters, use a sans serif font and use serial commas.
- 10. Color contrast on video captions is sufficient.
- 11. Captions do not obstruct important content in the video. When possible place captions under the speaker.
- 12. Label speakers and there is more than one person speaking in the video. It is recommended to label people. Even if you do not know the names, general labels such as "professor" and "student" are acceptable.
