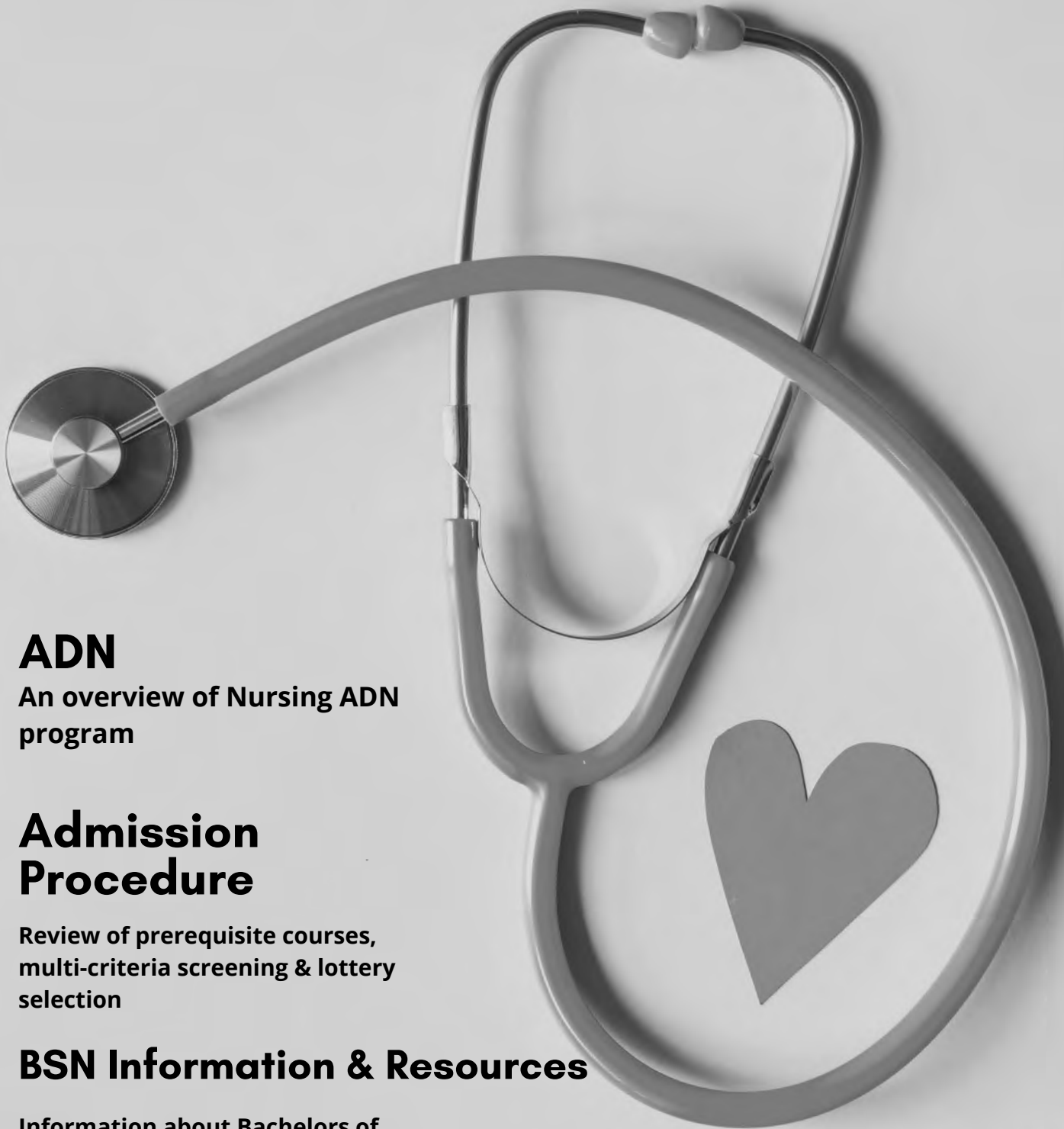

Welcome

The Nursing Department at Mt. San Antonio College is a two-year program designed to prepare individuals at the Associate Degree level for entry into registered nursing practice. The California Board of Registered Nursing approved the program. Most recently, the program has received accreditation from The Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). Licensed Vocational Nurses and Psychiatric Technicians are eligible to pursue advanced placement into the degree track earning an Associate of Science Degree in Nursing.

To promote diversity, equity, and inclusion of the student population, the selection method to accept candidates combines random and multi-criteria screening processes.

Prerequisites

2.5 or better GPA required:

- ANAT 10A **or** ANAT 35
- ANAT 10B **or** ANAT 36
- MICR 1 **or** MICR 22*
- ENGL 1A **or** equivalent
- Eligibility for college-level math

*CHEM 10 or 40 is a prerequisite for MICR 1 or 22

Multi-Criteria Screening

The multi-criteria screening will be used to measure each applicant's merit points. The screening measures six categories adding up to a 100-point scale.

Applicant Pool

Two methods are available to determine the lottery:**

- A cut score from the multiple-criteria screening **or**
- Select the top 200-250 applicants

**A portion of the top-scoring applicants will bypass the Lottery pool

Final Selection

- Random selection of 150 students from the lottery pool.
- Starting November 1, 2024, a composite score of 70% or greater on the ATI TEAS exam will be considered passing.

Up to sixty (60) students are admitted for fall and spring cohorts.

*An overall grade point average of 2.5 with no grade less than a "C" for each course; Only one D/F grade repeat of any of the three science prerequisites, Anatomy, Physiology, and Microbiology, is allowed. Science courses cannot be older than seven years upon entrance of the program. Grades of "Ws" or "EWs" do not count toward the repeat policy.

Additionally, no grades of C minus (C-) are allowed for major required coursework.

1. Previous Academic Degrees, diplomas, or relevant certificates

Maximum Points = 20

Please note that points in this section cannot be combined.

Multi-Criteria Screening

2. Work or volunteer experience in healthcare

Maximum Points = 20

The term healthcare setting represents a broad array of services and places where healthcare occurs, including but not limited to acute care hospitals, urgent care centers, rehabilitation centers, nursing homes, and other long-term care facilities, specialized outpatient services (e.g., hemodialysis, dentistry, podiatry, chemotherapy, endoscopy, and pain management clinics), community health center, and outpatient surgery centers. Work letters with less than 1,000 but more than 300 hours completed may be submitted under the volunteer box for review on a case-by-case basis.

Recent work experience with direct human patient care **within the past five years.** Must have verification from human resources or employer verifying the number of hours worked and job title and job duties.

Current Licensure as LVN, Respiratory Therapist, Physical Therapist Assistant, Occupational Therapy Aide: All with work experience greater than 1000 hours. Phlebotomist, Psychiatric Technician, Current Allied Health Certification such as Paramedic, EMT, CNA, IHSS, Caregiver, Corpsman: All with work experience greater than 1000 hours.

Work: Letter from current/former employer verifying employment. The letter must be on organization letterhead with an original signature. It must include the applicant's name (must match the name on the application), start date and end date (if applicable), employment status (full-time/part-time), the total number of hours worked, and examples of job duties related to the patient care (i.e., taking vital signs, assisting with ADLs) (*** see note below**), job title, and department (if applicable). For IHSS workers, in addition to the letter from the employer, please provide the contract from the CDSS.

***Documents can consist of multiple pages.**

i.e., the employment letter, job description from the manager, and/or job description from the employer's website for the specified job.

(Occupations listed are examples only and are not an exhaustive list of certifications/licenses that may be accepted. The admissions committee will determine the acceptance of work experience.)

Multi-Criteria Screening

Recent volunteer experience in a healthcare setting **within the past 5 years**. Must have verification from organization verifying the number of hours volunteered and volunteer duties.

Relevant healthcare volunteer experience in a healthcare setting (300 hours within the past five years).

Volunteer: Letter from current/former organization verifying volunteer service. The letter must be on organization letterhead with an original signature. It must include the applicant's name (must match the name on the application), start date and end date (if applicable), the total number of hours volunteered, and examples of duties related to patient care (*** see note below**). This can include, but not limited to taking vital signs, assisting with ADL's

***Documents can consist of multiple pages.** i.e., a letter from a current/former organization verifying volunteer service, a job description from the manager, and a job description from the organization's website for the specified job.

(Healthcare settings listed are examples only and are not an exhaustive list that may be accepted. The admissions committee will make the final determination of acceptance of volunteer experience.)

Multi-Criteria Screening

3. Life experiences or special circumstances

Maximum Points = 4

An applicant may have one or more in this category, but the maximum number of points awarded is four. Documentation will only be required for areas that may apply.

Ways to Earn Points

15 points

Earn an Associate Degree

Kinesiology & Wellness, AA is a good choice because it meets the pre-nursing prerequisite & general education requirements.



20 or 12 points

Work/Volunteer Experience: CNA, EMT, Medical Assistant



School of Continuing Education provides short-term health vocational programs such as CNA, EMT, and Medical Assistant for FREE. The work experience must have active direct patient care experience (such as ADL's) to qualify for points. Volunteer experience must be completed in a "healthcare setting" to qualify for points.

Maximize Points

Get good grades in ANAT 10A/35, 10B/36, and MICR 1/22

- Try to get a combination of two "A" grades and one "B" grade in these classes, at the lowest
- Only **one** repeat of the three science classes
- Withdrawals ("Ws") or ("EWs") do not count as a repeat for Mt. SAC's nursing program

Lottery

Determine a cut score from the multi-criteria screening process out of 100 points.
For example, if 70% is the cut score, all applicants who meet 70% of the cut score will be placed in the Lottery Pool.

Select the top 200-250 applicants, and place them in the Lottery Pool

TEAS-Nursing Readiness Exam

A random selection of 150 applicants will be invited to take the TEAS exam.*

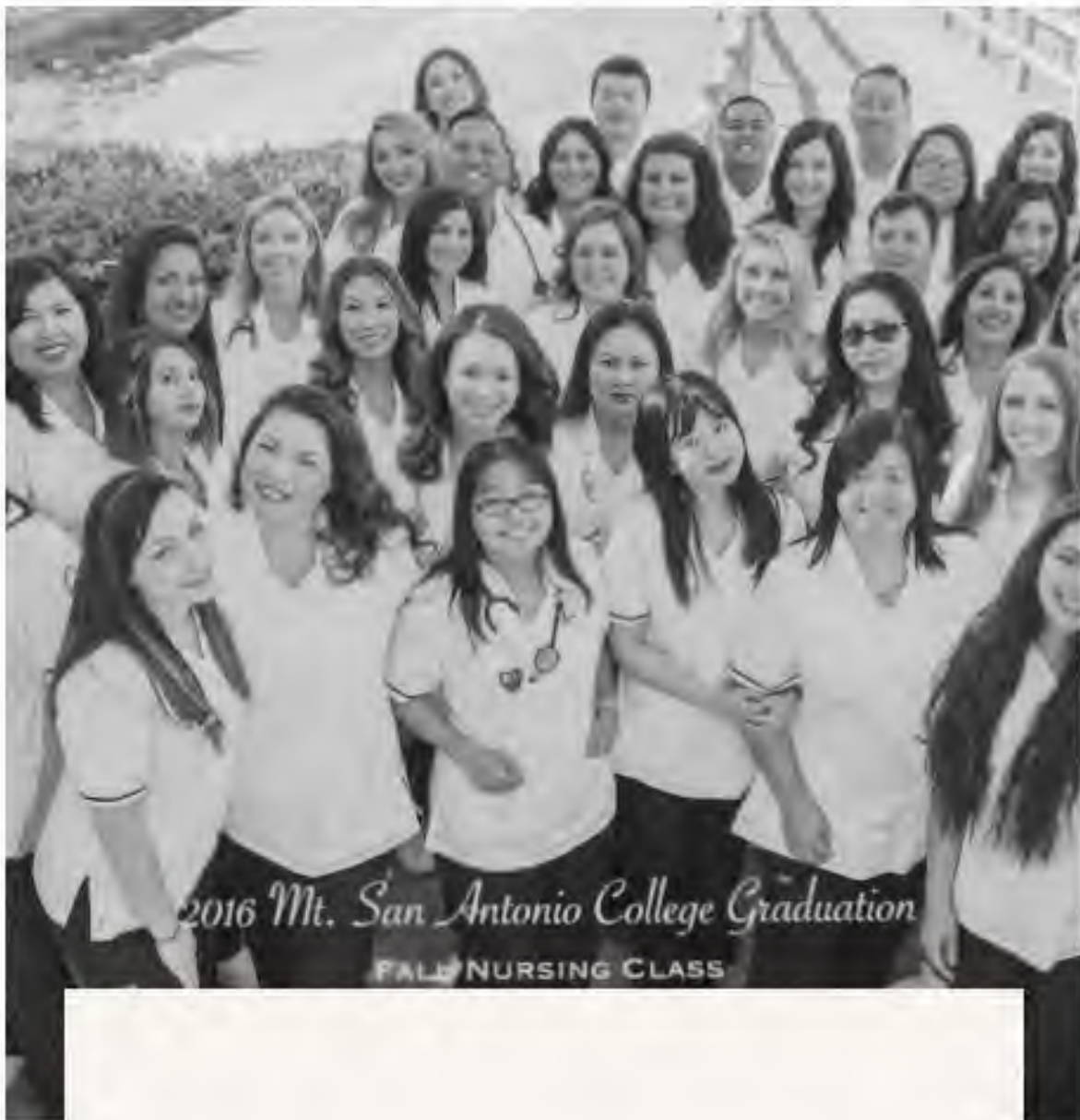
*Starting Nov 1, 2024, passing score will be 70%.

GENERAL INFORMATION

This agreement displays all lower-division courses required in the major. CSU Northridge courses on the left, approved (articulated) transfer courses to the right, General education (CSU GE Breadth or IGETC or CSU Northridge GE) and upper-division courses are also required to complete the bachelor's degree.

R.N. to B.S.N. GENERAL INFORMATION

Registered Nurse (RN) to Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program is limited to Registered Nurses. Separate application is required. Associate degree in Nursing, or its equivalent, from a regionally accredited program and current licensure as a Registered Nurse in California are required.

Minimum grade of "C" or better is required in the lower-division courses (and labs) in anatomy, physiology, chemistry, microbiology, and introductory statistics.

California State University (CSU) Upper Division Transfer Requirements:
Students are eligible for upper-division admission with completion of 60 CSU transferable units that include:

- A minimum of 30 lower-division units of general education courses with grades of C- or better
- Courses from general education areas A1, A2, A3, and B4 with a grade of C- or better
- 2.0 CSU transferable GPA (This is the *minimum* GPA for consideration; many campuses/majors are competitive and may require a higher GPA for admission.)

Students must be in good standing at the last college or university attended.

CSU General Education Notes

1. Courses on this list have been approved by the CSU Office of the Chancellor for Fall 2019 and beyond. If a course was completed prior to approval, it cannot be certified for CSU General Education Breadth requirements.
2. Some majors require specific general education courses. Students planning to transfer are advised to plan their schedules carefully in order to maintain progress.

INTERSEGMENTAL GENERAL EDUCATION TRANSFER CURRICULUM (IGETC) 2019 - 2020
The courses listed below will fulfill the lower-division general education requirements for all UC campuses.

Completion of the IGETC will permit a student to transfer from Mt. SAC to a campus in either the University of California (UC) system or California State University (CSU) without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower-division general education courses to satisfy university general education requirements. It should be noted that completion of the IGETC is not an admission requirement for transfer to UC or CSU, nor is it the only way to fulfill the lower-division general education requirements of UC or CSU prior to transfer. Students pursuing majors that require extensive lower-division preparation may not find the IGETC option to be advantageous (i.e., Engineering, Science).

A minimum grade of "C" is required in each course. (A grade of "C-" is not acceptable.)

NOTE:
UC credits transfer credit for some courses. Students may review the UC Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) with a counselor or educational advisor.
